Chairman's Report



Kate Reid, Chairman Cancer Society of NZ Canterbury-West Coast Division At the end of this financial year, I am once again proud and thankful for the work of our staff and volunteers throughout the region as they work towards reducing the incidence and impact of cancer in our community. On behalf of the Executive Committee, I want to thank them all for their unfailing commitment to the Cancer Society. Another busy year ended with the challenge of the Covid-19 pandemic and lockdown disrupting all our lives. This added an extra burden on those waiting for test results, accessing screening, living with cancer and getting to and from treatment. But once again in the face of adversity, heart-warming stories, creativity, rallying together to support and cope in yet another challenge, demonstrated the true caring grit of our region.

This global pandemic will influence our lives for some time to come and the incoming Executive committee are mindful of the financial impact this will have in the coming year with so many of our fundraising activities postponed or cancelled. This modest Annual Report format, produced in-house, is respectful of the need to ensure our funds are put to prudent use in the areas of supportive care services, health promotion and research.

The Property Committee has continued to work on the future needs for people requiring accommodation during treatment and a community centre that is accessible and fit for purpose. I reported, last year, on the discussions with CDHB, developers, real estate agents, project managers, architects, planners and fundraisers to ensure we get the best possible advice to meet our Christchurch centre and accommodation needs. We are now much closer to acquiring land that will enable us to co-locate for improved efficiencies in operation and access to services.

We are also pleased to be able to better support our North Canterbury region with a Cancer Society hub now operating in Rangiora. The steady stream of people accessing our services and the overwhelming support received from the North Canterbury community, since the doors opened in early March, has validated our decision to open this community centre

The Executive welcomed Ruth Gerring to the committee this year. Ruth is a senior nurse in the oncology department at Christchurch Hospital and an excellent advocate for people receiving cancer treatment. It is a privilege to work with all our Executive members, who give their time willingly to support the work of the Division - thank you most sincerely for another productive year. Thank you also to the ANZ Bank, our principal sponsor of Daffodil Day and major sponsor of the Cancer Society of New Zealand. To the committed supporters of all our events and our collaborative relationships with other health and community agencies in our Canterbury-West Coast Division, I thank you for another positive year towards meeting our mission.



Treasurer's Report


The twelve months to 31 March 2020 were shaping up to be a good year. Then came COVID-19. While the Division still managed a reasonable financial year, the challenges of the global pandemic will continue to have a significant impact on our finances throughout the 2020-21 financial year. For the year ended 31 March 2020 the Division recorded an operating surplus of \$34,000. The Trust Board recorded an operating surplus of \$674,000. The community continues to support the Division financially, and without this ongoing support, we would not be able to offer the free services provided. To all those who have helped during the year - thank you.

Looking forward, our focus will be on our ongoing property needs for patient accommodation and community facilities. This building project, once underway, will require a significant amount of capital investment. In order to have the funds available for this development, the Trust Board and Division have maintained higher than usual levels of reserves.

The investment markets have presented a challenge as they respond to the likely economic impact of COVID-19. Fortunately, the Trust Board and Division have maintained a higher than normal level of liquid investments, in preparation for funding the building project, so were not impacted significantly by the large fall in the equity markets in late March 2020. The very low return on investments will be our ongoing challenge and an issue we are likely to have to live with for some years ahead. David McCone


