John Murdoch and his wife Joy stayed at Daffodil House

John Murdoch from Geraldine was diagnosed with squamous cell carcinoma of the lung in July 2022.

"I had a sore arm for a few years and didn't do much about it," John says. "I went to see my doctor and they sent me for an X-ray and then a scan."

"That showed that I had a mass in my chest wall, outside of my lung and around three of my ribs," he says.

A biopsy showed that the cancer hadn't spread.

"It was good to hear that," John says. "I felt so lucky."

Surgery wasn't an option for John because of his tumour's location. The recommended treatment was a sixweek course of radiation combined with weekly chemotherapy at Christchurch Hospital. Following this, John learned he could be suitable to receive additional immunotherapy treatment at Timaru Hospital. John's sister had also had cancer. so John and wife Joy knew about the Cancer Society

The couple contacted the South Canterbury Cancer Society and met with Supportive Care team member Monica.

"Monica was lovely and helped us to organise what we needed," John says.

Monica advised John and Joy about the Cancer Society's free accommodation in Christchurch, and she rang ahead to check that a ground floor room was available for John.

"It's absolutely wonderful being able to stay here at Daffodil House – the staff are amazing and it's a real home away from home," Joy says.

"It's nice being here because everybody is in the same boat, and you've got people to talk to - I couldn't think of a better way of doing it."

"The shuttle is another great service," John says. "It's absolutely brilliant for going to the hospital – otherwise you'd have to get up much earlier as you can't get a carpark there. A big thank you to the Cancer Society for providing this service."

This year, 1,500 people like John will stay in our accommodation while they receive cancer treatment in Christchurch

About Lung Cancer

There are two main types of lung cancer:

- · Small cell lung cancer (SCLC) makes up about 15-20 percent of lung cancers.
- · Non-small cell lung cancer (NSCLC) is the most common type and makes up about 80 percent of all lung cancers.
- · Squamous cell lung cancer is a type of non-small cell lung cancer and is most often found in the centre of the lung near a main airway (bronchus).

Symptoms of Lung Cancer

The symptoms of lung cancer can vary from person to person. Some people with cancer have no symptoms. They may find out they have lung cancer when it is seen on a chest X-ray done for another reason. Other people may notice some, or all, of the following symptoms:

- · A cough that doesn't go away or a change in a cough you have had for a long time
- · Loss of voice or a change in voice (hoarseness)
- Feeling breathless or wheezy without exercising, or becoming unable to do your usual activities

- A chest infection that doesn't improve with treatment, or frequent chest infections
- Chest, upper back or shoulder pain that does not go away
- · Coughing up blood
- Weight loss for no reason, or loss of appetite
- · Feeling very tired.

These symptoms can be caused by reasons other than cancer. That is why it is important to have your GP or whānau doctor check any of these symptoms.
