

Huge Jump in SunSmart Accredited Schools!

As we move into the summer months, we must be more cautious of the UV rays and the harm they cause. UV rays are the rays of radiation emitted from the sun, even on cloudy days where it may not feel hot UVA can still cause damage to our skin. Over 90% of skin cancer is caused by overexposure to UV Radiation, we can protect ourselves by remembering to Slip (slip on a t-shirt and under shade), Slop (slop on some sunscreen), Slap (slap on a hat), and Wrap (wrap on some sunglasses). Using all four measures of protection provides better safety from the sun.

Our Health Promotion team will be busy this summer to ensure the community get the best protection from UV rays at events, in schools, and at the beach. Our SunSmart in Schools accreditation program helps schools reach optimum sun protection for their students. Our Health Promoters help with sun protection policy writing, advice on shade, and education in the classrooms, so that schools can reach accreditation and that students and staff understand the importance of being SunSmart.

Our team have been busy at work supporting schools to become SunSmart accredited. We've seen a significant increase in the number of schools accredited across Central Districts, going from 119 in 2023 to 173 this year! That's a 45% increase! This is a crucial area of work as supporting young people to develop SunSmart habits significantly reduces their chances of developing skin cancer in the future.

Health Promotion is active in Gisborne!

Our new health promoter Catriona Jones in Gisborne had the opportunity to join the Gisborne District Council East Coast Roadshow for their monthly hikoi up "the coast". The roadshow is a fantastic chance for often isolated communities to have local access to a wide range of organisations, such as IRD, Community Law, etc. For us it's about bringing cancer prevention information to people rather than leaving people to have to go out of their way to access it.

Another significant event the Gisborne Cancer Society attended was the Empower You Women's Expo in September. There were over 300 attendees and 80+ stall holders, guest speakers and workshop hosts. It was a fabulous day with a relaxed vibe that allowed women to take time to learn something new.

Cancer Society Gisborne Centre had a stall that provided reminders about breast and cervical screening as well as the link between alcohol consumption and seven different cancers. People were calling in, asking great questions, and being proactive about their well-being. Visitors were also given some 'homework' to do based on what they value. It encouraged them to take time to look at what matters to them and see if their life reflects what they value. Health promotion is a key part of our mission, and we are very excited to have Catriona on board to further our work in Gisborne.

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Daffodil Day Round Up!

As summer approaches we wanted to take a moment to reflect on this year's Daffodil Day appeal. Every year we are overwhelmed by the incredible spirit and generosity of our communities. Whether it's someone donating on the day, a volunteer out collecting on the street, or a grower giving us their daffodils, it all makes a huge difference. Daffodil Day helps us to fund vital transport to and from treatment, provide free counselling services, and supports cancer prevention programs such as SunSmart schools. We wanted to share a story from each centre about how the day went in their community. These stories by no means reflect everything that happened and everyone that made a difference in each area, but highlight some of the positive stories from our communities.

Manawatū

Daffodil Day 2024 was another a great community run and supported event for the Manawatū Cancer Society. Despite the weather it was lovely to see so many volunteers from all ages out there doing their bit to support us and each other. One group who have been fundraising on our behalf since the mid-1990s is the Hokowhitu Bridge Club, who organise a Daffodil Day tournament. This year they had over 80 registrations for a full day of playing bridge. Our local Heartland Lions group jumped on board to make and serve soups for their fundraising lunch, which was greatly appreciated and we have heard were delicious! After a full and competitive day, the prize giving and donation to the Cancer Society was revealed. We were very happy to accept the generous donation from the tournament this year which was amazing and goes so far to help us provide our essential services.



Without groups like the Hokowhitu Bridge club doing these events for us, fundraising would be so much harder to achieve. So to all those that supported Daffodil Day this year, thank you!

Hawke's Bay

Taranaki

They had small stalls setup selling fresh Daffodils, merchandise, baking, raffles and local Mayor, Phil Nixon, selling his famous Burgers! All ingredients for the iconic steak burgers were sponsored. They sold for \$20 each and were sold out within 45minutes! This is the first time we have had a Daffodil Day presence in Hāwera for sometime so it was great to see the community come out in support. The committee also organised a local musician who donated his time for the day which massively added to the atmosphere. The event was enjoyed by the community and there was a great turn out.

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Gisborne

Our annual Daffodil Day Campaign saw the local schools and early childhood centres around Gisborne and the East Coast produce some awesome events on our behalf. Highlights include a massive raffle run by Rewanui ECE with all prizes donated from their local families, an evening hosted by Bizzy Bodz ECE where the children auctioned off artwork they had created, a delicious hāngī lunch at Rerekohu Area School where the BoT matched their donations dollar for dollar and of course LOTS of yellow dress up days around the community. It was encouraging to see so many tamariki from the next generation step up and show their support and generosity for Daffodil Day. There was a noticeable influx of the



younger generation this year, going above and beyond with their support for us. From little ones out picking fresh daffodils each week to youngsters helping with the street collection. Of particular mention is the two young volunteers from Ormond School who made numerous phone-calls around their local farms to help organise having sheep donated to our annual stock drive.



Whanganui

Daffodil Day is always a special community event here in Whanganui. This year the Remix Runway challenged over 50 young people from across Whanganui to upcycle a wedding dress into a fashion statement. It was a great opportunity for young people to engage with the Cancer Society, while also growing their creativity, and earning NCEA credits. The event was well supported with more than 250 attendees packing the Whanganui racecourse to watch the show!
