Because we receive no direct government funding, we operate as an independent body.

## Our mission

Improving community wellbeing by reducing the incidence and impact of cancer.

### Strategic aims

- **Health promotion.** A growing number of New Zealanders demonstrate cancer risk-reducing behaviours and inequalities are addressed.
- **Supportive care.** Those affected by cancer are well informed, cared for and supported throughout their cancer experience.
- **Information/resources.** The production of high-quality, culturally appropriate and evidence-based information and resources in the Society's focus areas.
- **Research.** Donations are used to fund research that builds on the evidence, and enhances the reputation of CSNZ in the public, academic and clinical communities.
- **Advocacy & relationships.** Effective advocacy and relationships that enhance the leadership role, improve cancer control and contribute to funding for CSNZ activities.
- **Volunteering.** Our organisation is engaged with our communities, including volunteer involvement that supports us to achieve our mission and vision.
- **Funding.** Increased income to grow the capability of the Society in a sustainable way.

# Reports



Our mission is to improve community wellbeing by reducing the impact of cancer. To achieve this we rely on the goodwill and generosity of the public, our sponsors, staff and hundreds of volunteers.

It has been another very busy year for the Cancer Society Wellington. As you will

see in our financial report, we raised income of \$3.1 million, but our expenditure for the year was \$3.6 million. Unfortunately our bequest income which has been averaging over \$1 million each year dropped to around half that in the last 12 months. We have utilised over \$500,000 of our reserves to cover this shortfall, although this was counterbalanced in part by unrealised investment gains of \$286,000.

Daffodil Day and Relay For Life continue to be our biggest fundraisers and significantly contribute to our income. A big thank you to staff, volunteers, sponsors and relayers - I attended all four of the Division's Relay events and was moved by each of them.

Many thanks also to our Friends of the Cancer Society committee who organised a spectacular charity ball in May 2012. The Ball was held in conjunction with the Diplomatic Head Of Mission Spouses' Group and over \$259,000 was raised.

**A recent focus has been to improve our engagement with two sectors of our community - namely Māori and men - who both feature poorly in health and cancer statistics.**

Delivering on our service plan for Māori, Mātātuhi Arahī, two initiatives have proven successful in this area: Our Kia ora - E te iwi project and the launch of our men's health website [www.getthetools.org.nz](http://www.getthetools.org.nz).

Thank you to every person who has supported us this past year. I hope you will support the Cancer Society in meeting the challenges we face in the next 12 months.

# Research

## The Cancer Society is one of the largest investors in cancer research in New Zealand.

In the past financial year, we the Wellington Division has given \$192,000 in grants for local cancer research projects and professional development costs for cancer researchers, oncologists, and radiation therapists. We have also provided \$340,000 to the Cancer Society's national research fund administered by the national office. This funding supports larger nationally approved research projects.

Grant applications are managed by a Medical & Scientific Committee - local experts including biomedical researchers and oncology specialists, who volunteer their time.

## People & projects supported this financial year include:

Dr Jason Gurney, Dept. of Public Health, University of Otago, Wellington, received \$13,204 in funding to undertake further research into the links between testicular cancer and cryptorchidism across different ethnic groups in New Zealand.

Prof. Mike Berridge of Malaghan Institute of Medical Research, Wellington, was awarded \$40,500 in funds to undertake further research into the relationship between glycolysis and tumour growth and metastasis. It is hoped that this research could lead to breakthroughs in slowing down or stopping tumour growth.


Jenni Drew, Radiation Therapist at Wellington Hospital, was provided with a professional development grant of \$1617 to undertake a Lymphoedema in Cancer Care (Master Module) through the Royal Marsden Hospital in London. This will provide Jenni with additional skills and knowledge in the treatment of cancer patients dealing with lymphoedema post cancer treatment.

Assoc. Prof. Louise Signal, Health Promotion and Policy Research Unit, University of Otago, Wellington, received \$15,178 in funding to research and develop a Sun Protection toolkit to support teachers and carers in early childhood centres. The project aims to educate and reduce the incidence of skin cancers in New Zealand.

Medical Library, School of Medicine and Health Sciences, University of Otago, Wellington, received a grant of \$25,000 to support the purchase of cancer related journals and publications. These are widely used by cancer researchers, students and clinicians.

## Health Promotion

### Cancer Update week

“Science Fact or Science Fiction”, with key note speaker Professor Dallas English gave health professionals, general public and volunteers an opportunity to review the latest evidence on lifestyle factors and cancer.

### Understanding Cancer

Three hui and one fono held in the Wellington region. Health and social service providers were supported by community working groups to upskill in the area of ‘What is cancer?’ and have a broader understanding of what services are available for their clients. Funded by Central Cancer Network.

### Men’s health - leading the way

- Working towards a national men’s health strategy.
- Extensive redevelopment of the Get The Tools website resource, which came second place in website category for the Writemark Plain English awards.
- Volunteer training for men’s health volunteer community champions.
- Strengthened relationship with Movember funding organisation.



### SunSmart accreditation:

### Physical activity & nutrition

Research reinforces the importance of being physically active in reducing cancer risk. We supported community initiatives that promote this key message and staff are encouraged to role model an active and healthy lifestyle.

### Tobacco control

- 15 motivational interviewing programmes for health and social service providers.
- Advocacy to support progress towards achieving the national goal of Smokefree Aotearoa by 2025.
- Encouraged councils to implement smokefree outdoor policy.

### Inspiring Māori & Pacific men

Sparked by Relay For Life Porirua, a group of Māori and Pacific men cycled from Cape Reinga to Bluff, with our support.



The Cancer Society of New Zealand (Wellington Division) Incorporated is an Incorporated Society under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and is a registered Charity under the Charities Commission. The Society has made an explicit and unreserved statement of compliance with generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand, consisting of the Financial Reporting Standards and the Statements of Standard Accounting Practice in note one to its full financial statements. The summary financial statements are represented in New Zealand dollars.

The full and summary financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2013 were authorised for issue on 20 June 2013 and have been audited with a modified audit opinion issued. The summary financial report cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial report of the statement of financial position, statement of financial performance, statement of cash flows and statement of movements in accumulated funds of the Society.
