Your planned gift could include:

- A percentage (or whole) of your estate
- A sum of money
- Property
- · Stocks and shares
- A life insurance policy, annuities or trust.

We value every gift you may wish to give, no matter what form or amount it is.

Your gift will be used in the area you live in, unless you indicate otherwise in your bequest.

Support & Information

The Cancer Society offers emotional, social and financial support for people affected by cancer.

Our frontline services include:

- Expert Cancer Information Nurses who provide advice in-person or via phone and email
- A large team of volunteers who enable us to provide vital services such as driving patients to and from treatment, supporting patients who are receiving treatment at oncology wards and home visits
- Support groups for those living with and beyond cancer
- Specialised counselling for people affected by cancer and their whānau/family.

Advocacy

We advocate for equitable public health outcomes. This means we have strong established relationships with the media to comment on public health issues such as tobacco control, skin cancer prevention and equitable access to cancer treatment and screening programmes.

Daffodil House, Daffodil Lodge and Margaret Stewart House

If you need out-patient cancer treatment in Christchurch or Wellington, Daffodil House and Daffodil Lodge (Christchurch) and Margaret Stewart House (Wellington) provide a 'home away from home' for people who need a place to stay. The facilities provide accommodation, companionship and support for cancer patients and caregivers who are facing time away from the comfort and surroundings of their own home.

Research

The Cancer Society is a major funder of life-saving and world-class cancer research through our Research Grants Programme, dedicated to find ways to reduce, treat or eradicate the risks associated with cancer.

Health Promotion

We work collaboratively with community groups to provide a range of resources to help people make healthy lifestyle choices to reduce their risk of cancer.

Health Equity

We work alongside communities to improve cancer outcomes for vulnerable populations.



Planning your gift

Leaving a planned gift is a very personal decision. Decide on a gift that's suitable to you. If you would like your bequest to be used for a specific purpose, we would be pleased to discuss your options in person.

There are many ways you can arrange to leave a gift to the Cancer Society in your will. Your solicitor, trustee or the Public Trust can assist with the detail, but in general, there are three main types of bequests:

- Residuary Gift leaving a portion or the remainder of your estate to the Cancer Society after all other commitments have been honoured
- Specific Gift leaving a specific item, such as property or shares to the Cancer Society
- Pecuniary Gift a gift to the Cancer Society of a stated sum of money designated in your will.

Preparing your will

Here is an example of the words you can use:

"I bequeath The Cancer Society Marlborough (CC28545)	
the sum of dollars [or	a percentage of your
residual estate], to be applied by the Cancer Society	
in such a manner as its Directors may determine [or	
for the purposes of]. I direct that a
receipt from the Cancer Society shall be a good and	
sufficient discharge to my Executors.	



Receive \$250 towards your legal costs

Once you have made a bequest to us through your will, or a memorandum of wishes, you can arrange for your lawyer or the Public Trust to send us an account for up to \$250 plus GST towards the cost of your legal fees.

The Hope Fellowship

Please let us know if you have made a bequest, as this helps us plan for future projects, and enables us the opportunity of engaging with you on the future use of your funds if you wish. Telling us your wishes is of course 100% confidential.

When you contact us, we will offer to make you a lifetime member of the Hope Fellowship — a small way to acknowledge your commitment and generosity.

You will then receive:

- A lapel pin to commemorate the promise of a bequest
- With your consent, a special mention in appropriate Cancer Society publications.

Joining the Hope Fellowship is completely up to you. We understand that some supporters wish to remain anonymous and, of course, we always respect the wishes of those who want to keep their bequests confidential.
